A Strategic Reset? How to deal with an increasingly repressive and confrontational Russia 24 March 2022

The Putin System has shifted more and more towards dictatorship over the past years, barely disguised behind a pseudo-democratic facade. The most obvious manifestation of this transformation are the ongoing repressions that stifle civil society, independent media outlets and the democratic opposition.

Russia's confrontational foreign policy is the other side of the same coin. Concerted attempts to destabilize open societies, the ongoing war in the Donbas, military interventions in Syria, regular breaches of the Baltic airspace, the ongoing military threat against Ukraine and the deployment of irregular forces in several countries all show that the regime's aggressive turn is not just taking place in the domestic sphere. Moscow's assistance in suppressing the recent mass protests in Kazakhstan is part of the authoritarian consolidation in the post-Soviet space.

How should the West deal with these new realities? The Kremlin's ultimate demands for a fundamental revision of the European order are confronting the West with a strategic choice: Should the EU and the US pursue a grand bargain with Russia, or do we need more readiness for deterrence and containment? What are opportunities for balancing interests and where do we need a policy of strength vis-à-vis the Kremlin?
